## The CCMC Story (Chapter one)

The Press of 10 June 1941 reported that a Canterbury Music Festival Committee was to be formed to take the place of the Canterbury Centennial Music Festival Committee. That body was disbanded at the conclusion of the 1940 Canterbury Centennial celebrations.

The group that emerged then continues to this day and beyond. It is now known as Christchurch Civic Music Council (CCMC) with a 'nickname' of Music Canterbury reflecting the wide scope of its coverage. The CCMC supports the activities and purposes of around 50 iconic music and related entities involving community orchestras, choirs, jazz and drummer groups, and Music Schools as well as thousands of school students all over the province (e.g. for Strike, Strum and Blow festivals).





From the archives here is a photograph of world artists who came to support the Centennial Music Festival of 1940 and the banner for the Theatre royal concerts from 24 May to 2 June that year. They were: (back row - left to right) F. Bermingham, Harrison Cook, Raymond Beatty, NZ's Oscar Natzke, and W. A. Jameson; (front row) T. Andrews, CCMC committee, Anderson Tyrer, Director of Music (he became the 1<sup>st</sup> conductor of the NZBC Orchestra) and Heddle Nash. NB: Canterbury now celebrates its anniversary on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Friday after the 1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday in November each year. *More chapters about Affiliates and CCMC in following issues of the Affiliates' Journal*.

### Re - opening of Christchurch Town Hall

After more than 8 years of waiting the doors of the refurbished Christchurch Town Hall were opened.

Saturday 23 February 2019 saw many thousands of visitors who accepted the invitation to enjoy a preliminary walk - through. More numerous thousands repeated this on Sunday the 24th.

The official re-opening was scheduled for Wednesday 6 March 2019 at

1.10pm when Mayor Lianne Dalziel celebrated the occasion and Martin Setchell, the city's curator of the magnificent Reiger organ continued the ceremony with an hour-long free recital. There was a further free concert at 6.00pm the same day. However, patrons were invited to be armed with moolah to procure historic CD's and the like.

During the earlier walk-around days, visitors were entertained by a kaleidoscope of the city's iconic musical groups each taking turns to present 30-minute programmes in the Douglas Lilburn auditorium displaying a vast array of styles including classical string quartet, string and symphony orchestras, school wind band and jazz.

Martin Setchell gave foretaste snippets of the sound of the Reiger Pipe Organ during the changeovers from one musical group to another.


A few days earlier still, Architect Sir Miles Warren (Warren & Mahoney) toured the site as it neared completion and a special test was conducted – the Ferrier Fountains burst into life.



The Auditorium is named after Douglas Lilburn (1915 - 2001), one of NZ's most admired composers and initiator of the first NZ electronic music laboratory. Inspired by association with the electronic creation of TV's Dr Who Theme Tune, in 1963 he set up his electronic studio in the basement of the Hunter Building at Victoria University, Wellington – he is depicted above in the laboratory.

Performers agree that the Auditorium had and still has even more so today acoustics that are the equal of the best for a concert venue anywhere in the world. A visitor was overheard to say. " . . . We could hear that String Quartet right at the back even when it played pianissimo".

Apollo

formed as a string quartet 19 September 1953 with a concert celebrating the 60th anniversary of NZ Women getting the vote (the first in the world to do so). It also espoused the idea of professional and teacher players joining with advancing students to make music together and help develop musical skills.

Nigh on 66 years and still going strong, Apollo now comprises 101 members forming string ensembles, chamber orchestras and choral groups gathering on a session by session basis in Christchurch and in collaboration with other entities and regions. On occasions, Apollo performs under special banners to honour contributing artists; e.g. as the Lyndsay String Quartet, in 1963, it won the first ever NZ-wide Chamber Music Contest.

Apollo master-minds, as well as performs, at many major events: e.g.: engaging international and also leading local musicians for the concert ceremony that filled the Christchurch Town Hall to celebrate the 3,000th anniversary of Biblical King David's ascension to the Throne; organising with city officials, Maori parties, and iconic music entities to celebrate in a packed open-air Christchurch Square, the conclusion of the Sri Chinmoy Round-the-world Torch of Peace Run (similar to the Olympic Torch run); playing for the re-opening of the Christchurch Art Gallery; providing performers for the concert celebrating the 100th anniversary of the Westport region; running a series of fund-raising concerts, together with support from fellow musical entities, for the restoration of the unique George Sandford pipe organ in St Paul's Presbyterian Church, Kaikoura; performing at concerts celebrating the re-opening of the Great Hall in the Christchurch Arts Centre; regularly entertaining at City and South Island retirement villages, weddings, anniversaries, and provincial township events plus school demonstrations/master classes from Auckland to Dunedin; fund-raising for charitable purposes; performing original music by NZ composers; Apollo's D of M composes especially for theatre groups. E.g. over 13 years of Top Dog Theatre's outdoor Shakespeare seasons; Re-Act Theatre's "Castaways", "Murder in the Cathedral" and NASDA's "A Day in the Death of Joe Egg," etc. Apollo supports many fellow musical groups with players. In February 2019 Apollo String Quartet (ASQ) gave a recital for the re-opening of the Christchurch Town Hall, along with many other Christchurch Civic Music Council (CCMC) Affiliates. It also services Royal School of Church Music New Zealand Inc. (RSCMNZ) and Dew & Assoc.(music & academic publishers).

The Christchurch School of Music is a family-oriented community aimed at providing quality music education in and around Christchurch. The school has been an important part of the Christchurch music education scene for 62 years so why not come along and join us? It is currently kindly hosted outside school hours by Catholic Cathedral College Ferry Road and next door in its own Portacom buildings. These replaced the historic nunnery and Chapel in Barbadoes Street destroyed by the 22 February 2011 Christchurch Earthquake.

CSM is a not-for-profit organisation with a strong focus on community. From ages 2 to 92 we have something for everyone. On a Saturday morning the whole family can find something to suit. For the young ones there are pre-school and junior school classes, "Take Off with Music". The programme provides for four-and-a-half-year olds learning about rhythm (see picture below) leading to a start on Suzuki strings.

At 6 years of age the recorder is a great instrument to learn. In 2019 we have a fantastic deal for beginner recorder players – just \$52 for a year of tuition and this includes a recorder and a book!!

Older children and adults may opt for group or individual lessons on a specific instrument (including voice). With six orchestras, two concert bands, a Big Band, a jazz combo, 6 wind ensembles, rock bands, two choirs, chamber groups, a samba band and a guitar ensemble there is an ensemble to suit all levels and all ages. If affordability is an issue, CSM may be able to offer a discount through funding
