President's Report

The 79th Annual Report of the Christohurch Civic Music Council for the year ending 30 June 2020.

I am honoured to present the 79th Annual report of the Christchurch Civic Music Council. Despite the Covid-19 pandemic and the changes to everyone's calendars it caused I am pleased to report that the Music Council is in good heart with much to report. We are very pleased to acknowledge the continued support of our Affiliate organisations and also to welcome a number of new members. As will become clear our advocacy on behalf of the Affiliates is dependent on their engagement with us.

Early in the year we set ourselves a series of goals under each of the objectives set out in the Constitution and when these were examined in June we found that we had achieved so much the Council was prepared to give an A score. The Plan is now updated and sets the scene for the coming year.

The Civic Music Council was very pleased to award our former President Graeme Wallis, Honorary Life Membership at the October 2019 AGM. With great sorrow we acknowledge his death in November. He is remembered with affection by all whose lives he touched especially in music circles.

We were pleased to welcome Denise Murfitt and Doris Barnard as new volunteer members to the Executive at the 2019 AGM. At the same time we said farewell and expressed our gratitude for their sterling service to the organisation over the years to Martin Setchell, Sally Binnie and Patrick Shepherd. Celia Stewart and Judith Bell continue as seconded members. Each member of the Executive has a particular responsibility to report on at our monthly meetings. Our thanks must go to all members of the Council for their commitment to furthering Music in the City, advocating on behalf of all the Affiliates whenever the opportunity arises and attending concerts and events and applauding the contribution to the lively musical life of the city of Christchurch.

Every organisation is dependent on the nature and quality of its administration. There is no doubt that the CCMC is extraordinarily well served by its indomitable, dedicated and efficient Secretary Carmel Brown. Her knowledge and skills are very high valued and recognised by us all with gratitude. Similarly thank you must go to Cynthia King for the efficient and effective management of our finances.

The CCMC warmly congratulates Celia Stewart on being award the MNZM in 2019 and to enjoy the celebration in Turanga along with friends and performers.

The Journal and Affiliates:

Our congratulations and great thanks goes to Robert Tait who has continued to produce and edit the **Journal** which has been distributed to all Affiliates, City leaders, Libraries and associated organisations. It is a mine of information much of it provided by Affiliates keeping us all up to date with their activities. It is very clear that despite Lockdown and keeping ourselves safe and well Music in the city has been lively. The website kept us informed of webinar concerts and the monthly diary on which Affiliate concerts and events are noted provides items of interest to make sure are in our diaries. The success of the Journal is dependent on the continued interest of all Affiliates whose contributions are always welcome. The Affiliates fee provides free access to the Music Canterbury website — www.musiccanterbury.co.nz where your events can be listed on the calendar. It is regularly updated and entries should be emailed to: secretary@musiccanterbury.co.nz. This year we have introduced an Events Form Template https://musiccanterbury.co.nz/event-form-template/ — please use this when sending through your Event. We posted 173+ events on the calendar which is encouraging considering how many events were cancelled due to Covid-19. Please keep an eye of the website when planning events to avoid the clashes which sometimes occur. Let's make sure the CCMC Website becomes the first choice for Cantabrians when seeking a music event.

National Concerto Competition 2019-2020:

One highlight every year is the **National Concerto Competition.** 2019-20 was to be its 53rd year and devoted to aspiring pianists. A most successful preliminary competition took place in December at the Piano with Three Finalists selected for the finals in March – Lixin Zhang from Christchurch, Leon Chen, Auckland and Ashani Waidyatillake Auckland. It was with great regret that the Concerto Trust decided to cancel the final due to the Covid-19 pandemic and to award the prize money equally to the three finalists. This was well received by them since two have taken up scholarships at overseas Universities. Plans are ahead for the 2020-21 Competition although funding continues to be very difficult. Contestants have repeatedly reported that the opportunity to play a Concerto of their choice with an Orchestra - for us the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra are the highlights of the Competition. The Concerto Trust is committed to examining its structure and to securing the sustainability of the Competition for the future.

Strum Strike and Blow 2019:

The 2019 Strum Strike and Blow concert expertly and professionally planned and directed by Judith Bell and Celia Stewart ably assisted by Kate Husband attracted 1200 young people from 47 schools and a most appreciative audience. The enthusiastic joy of the young musicians as they performed on their marimbas, ukuleles and recorders was very rewarding. We are most grateful for the public and private financial support received for this event and to Avonhead Rotary for their assistance at the Horncastle Arena.

Civic Music Council Instruments:

The Council owns and maintains **four** instruments. The Neupert Harpsichord is now located at Know Church, Bealey Avenue and is available for hire at reasonable cost while the Upright Yamaha is in use at the Christchurch School of Music. One Steinway is leased by Burnside High School's Aurora Centres and is highly valued there. The second instrument is now located at St Margaret's College. Both these fine instruments provide the Council with a valuable source of income.

Arts Strategy:

Members of the **CCMC** Executive have participated in the City Council consultations on the **Arts Strategy** and we look forward to the final draft and its adoption by the City Council. We believe it is aspirational and now most significant as the City emerges from the Covid experience.

Finance:

The Civic Music Council appreciates the invaluable support it receives from the City Council through its Strengthening Communities Grant in order to provide administrative support. Numerous public and private sponsors allow the CCMC to function effectively and especially to mount the Strum Strike and Blow Concert and the Annual National Concerto Competition. Our gratitude for the list on the back of this report knows no bounds.

Ruby Hay Pianoforte Scholarship 2019:

The 37th Ruby Hay Pianoforte Scholarship was held on Sunday 20th October 2019 at the Recital Room, University of Canterbury Arts site. There were three contestants, Hannah Brand, Katie Gluyas and Dennis Yan. The examiner, Mr Christopher Tilbury LRAM ARCM from the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music, commented on each of the performances and presented the prizes. Dennis Yan was awarded first prize of \$1000 and Hannah Brand as runner up, won the Lois Mackintosh prize of \$200 donated by the IRMT and Katie Gluyas was third prize of \$100.00 donated by Margaret Austin. An audience, made of up family and friends, congratulated all the contestants and agreed it had been a successful event.

Radio New Zealand:

The CCMC was heartened by the response of so many of the Affiliates, individuals and former contestants of the Concerto Competition who rose to the occasion and bombarded Radio New Zealand with reaction to their intention to remove Concert FM to the AM network. CCMC wrote to the Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern as Minister of Arts Culture and Heritage, Hon Grant Robertson and Hon Kris Faafoi as well as Radio NZ Chair and the CEO. The cases presented by so many were persuasive and we are very pleased that FM transmission will not only continue but be enhanced. The CCMC has been acknowledged by CEO Paul Thompson as a Stakeholder for consultation in the future.

Now as our **Team of 5 million** basks in how well we have come through the trauma of the global pandemic the CCMC looks forward to continuing to advocate for Music and the Arts in Christchurch and New Zealand with the support of our Affiliates.

Entity's Purpose or Mission: *

Objects; 1. To secure by co-operation with civic and other authorities and organisations the fullest measure of public recognition and support of all forms of musical activity and to encourage the active interest and participation of the community in all forms of music making. 2. To foster and promote the study, practice and performance of musical works and in particular of choral, orchestral and operatic works. 3. To promote combined music festivals from time to time as may be practicable. 4. To co-operate with organisations having similar objects throughout New Zealand.

Entity Structure: *

The CCMC is governed by the Executive which consists of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and nine various members of a representative affiliated organisation elected at the AGM. Each elected member shall hold office for up to three years eligible for re-election at the end of their term. The CCMC established The Christchurch Civic Music Council National Concerto Competition Trust, and an update of the Trust's activities is provided at the AGM. The CCMC has three member types; affiliates (established musical organisations) that are independent entities and agree to co-operate with the CCMC in its efforts, associated organisations that have the capacity to support the objects, and honorary life members elected by not less than three quarters of the members present at any AGM.

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources:*

Operating costs are covered by a grant from the Christchurch City Council, and the affiliate subscription annual fee. Concerts are funded by grants, programme advertising and door ticket sales. Some revenue is received for piano and harpsicord hire.

Main Methods Used by the Entity to Raise Funds:*

The President with the assistance of an Executive member apply for grants to cover the costs of concerts and seek programme adverting income. Annually the Secretary applies for the Christchurch City Council grant. An Executive member manages the piano and harpsichord hire.

Entity's Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Services: *

All Executive members are encouraged to be actively involved in working on the CCMC's objects. Executive members are volunteers. The Secretary and Treasurer receive an honorarium to cover their costs. As a result of the earthquake, the music library is being stored at an affiliate's location at no charge, but the CCMC choose to waive their subscription in thanks. Every year an Executive member runs the Ruby Hay Competition. General meetings are currently run at the Christchurch School of Music at no cost.

Description of the Entity's Outcomes*:

Organised one concert to help strengthen music in the community. The Concert was Strum, Strike and Blow in association with Music Education Canterbury, a concert of primary school children playing ukuleles, marimba, and recorders. Affiliates are actively encouraged to utilise the Music Canterbury website to promote their concerts, and the Secretary maintains a calendar to assist affiliates plan the dates of their concerts. It is hoped that the website becomes the first choice for Cantabrians when seeking a music event.

Statement of Accounting Policies

"How did we do our accounting?"

For the year ended

Basis of Preparation*

The Christchurch Civic Music Council Incorporated (CCMC) has elected to apply PBESFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)*

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

The Christchurch Civic Music Council Incorporated (CCMC) is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Interest and Reserves

If the Statement of Performance is a surplus before interest, total interest received is transferred to reserves proportional to the opening reserve balances.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are depreciated using the following rates. Music Library is valued at realisable value.

- Office Equipment, diminishing value 20%-30%
- Instruments, straight line 3%
- Computer and setup, straight line 30%

Related Parties

The CCMC National Concerto Competition Trust is associated with the CCMC and the administration of both entities are carried out in the same office. The CCMC pay office expenses and oncharges 50%.

Changes in Accounting Policies

CCMC was registered for GST in 2015. Therefore current and comparative figures are GST excl. 50% of specific office expenses have been charged to CCMC National Concerto Competition Trust this year. There have been no other changes in accounting policies.
