We don't doubt you'll also love our three other CSO Presents concerts: Matariki with CSO, a showcase performance by Aotearoa hip hop legend Ché-Fu, and the fun and community spirit of our regular Last Night of the Proms.

Our Lamb & Hayward Masterworks series is packed full of new and familiar music across a wide range of different styles and experiences. Hear our orchestra shine in Bartók's brilliant Concerto for Orchestra, the mighty Symphony No. 2 of Jean Sibelius, the rarely heard Symphony No.1 of Douglas Lilburn and Symphony No. 4 of Charles Ives, Dvořák's beautiful Symphony No. 8 and Mahler's transcendent Symphony No. 4. Hear Alexander Gavrylyuk play Tchaikovsky's first Piano Concerto, Amalia Hall play the Beethoven Violin Concerto, discover the wondrous 21st century concerto by the late Finnish composer Jaakko Kuusisto performed by his dear friend Andrew Haveron, feel the warm embrace of the beautiful voices of CSO Chorus in Fauré Requiem. be swept up by the energy of clarinettist Julian Bliss performing concertos by Ross Harris and Artie Shaw, and hear the exquisite voice of Anna Leese singing Barber and Mahler. It's an amazing series and I can't wait for you to experience these concerts!

The Lamb & Hayward Curator's series continues to offer a vibrant and intimate orchestral experience with music from Mozart, Stravinsky, Haydn, Arvo Pärt, Albinoni, C.P.E. Bach, Delius, Richard Strauss, and a world premiere by Ōtautahi composer Isaac Shatford. Guest director Sophie Rowell's concert is not to be missed, as well as the solo appearances of Principal Oboe Jenny Clapp and Principal Horn Emma Eden. I hope you can join us for these guided performances, and meet us afterwards for an ice cream in New Regent Street!

MUSIGAL PARADE

We celebrate the vibrant career of Ōtautahiborn composer Maria Grenfell with her work Stealing Tutunui. She brings to life the Māori story of the chief Tinirau, his whale Tutunui, and the sinister Kae, using the many colours of the orchestra.

Described as "easily the most compelling pianist of his generation," Ukrainian-born Australian pianist Alexander Gavrylyuk is internationally recognized for his electrifying performances. Currently Artist in Residence at Wigmore Hall, London, he joins CSO to perform Tchaikovsky's majestic Piano Concerto No. 1 – a popular favourite for concert pianists and audiences around the world.

Each section of CSO will take a turn in the spotlight during Bartók's *Concerto for Orchestra* – a masterpiece that highlights what we all love about the orchestra. It shows off the many sides to Bartók's style: melodic charm, shadowy intensity, moments of rhythmic party music, and a notable 'Game of Couples' movement, where the families of woodwind and brass present themselves in pairs, offering a truly musical parade of our local talent.

This musical pairing of old and new features two masterpieces composed 100 years apart, celebrating both European and American musical traditions. We welcome renowned German conductor Johannes Fritzsch to CSO for the first time – he is currently Principal Conductor and Artistic Advisor of the Queensland Symphony Orchestra.

Hailed by *The Strad* for her "blazing insight and dazzling virtuosity," Aotearoa New Zealand's cherished violinist Amalia Hall performs Beethoven's only major work for solo violin and orchestra. It was composed during a period of intense creativity in 1806 and was revolutionary for its time, inviting the listener into a world of intimate dialogue between soloist and ensemble.

Charles Ives had just moved to New York at the turn of the twentieth century, stepping into an electrifying world of scientific and social progress. This was when he began writing his Second Symphony – a work that would take him 12 years to complete. It is both lyrical and lively, and displays his penchant for 'borrowing' – audiences may recognise hymn tunes, marches, and popular songs sprinkled throughout.



Sibelius' Symphony No. 2 was the first work that our Sibelius Academy-trained Chief Conductor Benjamin Northey conducted with CSO – we return to this gem of the repertoire in celebration of Ben's tenth year at the helm. The Sydney Morning Herald reviewed one of his recent interpretations of the work with "it was one of those performances where everything comes together magnificently to create a halcyon moment of surprised delight."

We pair Sibelius with another Finnish composer who local audiences will be thrilled to discover: Jaakko Kuusisto. The talents of British violinist Andrew Haveron will bring this virtuosic work off the page – as Concertmaster of the Sydney Symphony, and former Concertmaster of the BBC Symphony and first violinist of the Brodsky Quartet, he is an artist not to be missed.

The concert opens with a work written around the same time as Kuusisto's concerto but on our shores: Dame Gillian Whitehead's Retrieving the fragility of peace is dedicated to Lyell Cresswell, who passed away while she was writing the work, and she says "I think it may reflect something of the times we're living in, but words can't express as music does."

The Douglas Lilburn Auditorium – the beloved home of CSO – will reverberate with the sounds of its namesake Douglas Lilburn's First Symphony, a work written in 1949 by the composer often referred to as the 'grandfather of New Zealand music.' This is the ideal way to immerse yourself in the soundscape of the New Zealand classical music origin story.

CSO Chorus are a highlight of every season, and this year they will shine bright in Gabriel Fauré's Requiem – a serene work filled with beautiful melodies that was even performed at the composer's own funeral exactly 100 years ago. Many composers before him had penned requiems, and Fauré described his own as being "dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith and eternal rest."

Audiences will be treated to two of the most impressive solo voices of our time: Aotearoa New Zealand-based Australian soprano Emma Pearson, and baritone Roderick Williams – one of the UK's most sought-after baritones, who recently featured at the Coronation of King Charles III, the BBC Proms, as well as on stages around the world.



We welcome two international guests to CSO for the first time: conductor Carlo Antonioli, 2023 Assistant Conductor of the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra who is rapidly establishing himself across Australia; and versatile British clarinettist Julian Bliss.

This concert puts the clarinet on display, with the world premiere of a new clarinet concerto by Aotearoa composer Ross Harris written especially for our soloist; paired with the toe-tapping *Clarinet Concerto* of famous 1930s American jazz clarinettist and band leader Artie Shaw.

Audiences are also treated to music by two composers who had a great affinity with the folk music of their respective regions. Dvořák wrote nine symphonies, with much of his music infused with the flavours of Czech folk music – his bubbly eighth symphony from 1889 will conjure up a bird-filled forest walk near Dvořák's country home. Fast-forward 60 years to György Ligeti's Romanian Concerto, which brings to life a range of Romanian folk music that Ligeti loved, through instrumental colours and lively rhythms.

Be drawn into the dark and foreboding sound world of trailblazing French composer Lili Boulanger's *D'un soir triste* – written shortly before her death at the age of just 24, and full of musical expression beyond her years.

It was two years after the Second World War when Samuel Barber was commissioned to write Knoxville: Summer of 1915 by the Boston Symphony. Beautiful prose by the writer James Agee paints a picture of Tennessee in 1915, where a small boy lies in the grass and describes the sounds around him. Barber masterfully evokes childhood memories in his orchestration, and celebrated Aotearoa New Zealand soprano Anna Leese will sweep audiences up into the vivid scene.

Anna Leese also joins CSO for Mahler's Fourth Symphony, where the final movement is a soprano solo describing a child's carefree vision of heaven, with no music on Earth comparable to the music of the angels. It is known as Mahler's charming and childlike symphony, complete with jingling sleigh-bells, but also brings the quintessentially epic Mahlerian orchestral forces that need to be experienced live for full effect.



Mozart, Pärt, Delius, Stravinsky

Mozart needs little introduction – his overture to the 1787 opera *Don Giovanni* is one of the most hard-hitting openings in opera, setting the scene for one of the art form's most powerfully elusive protagonists to take the stage.

Estonian composer Arvo Pärt was deeply affected by the news of Benjamin Britten's death in 1976, and dedicated this work to him, with Pärt's famous minimalist style bringing a depth of emotion to the surface that is mesmerising. Our percussion section features in a setting of Delius' charming *On Hearing the First Cuckoo in Spring* for two marimbas and vibraphone.

Stravinsky wrote the music for Les Ballet Russes' production of *Pulcinella* alongside fellow artistic heavyweights of the time choreographer Sergei Diaghilev and set/costume designer Pablo Picasso. Stravinsky was asked to take inspiration from 18th century Italian musical styles – in a way that makes this music sound rather 'familiar' to classical music audiences. Pulcinella is a character who originated in 17th century *commedia dell'arte*, and this chamber orchestra-sized suite version of *Pulcinella* was premiered in 1922; several years after the full ballet.

Travel back in time to the opulence of the 1700s with accomplished Australian violinist Sophie Rowell as your guide. CSO has curated a trio of works composed during a sixty-year period, by three doyens of the Baroque and Classical periods.

Music was a real family affair over many generations for the Bach family. Carl Philipp Emmanuel was taught by his father J.S. Bach, and built an independent career during a time when the orchestra was coming into its own. This Symphony in C Major is packed with zesty energy and elegance.

Albinoni was one of the first Italian composers to write for the oboe – a newly emerging instrument at the time. This concerto is known for its ravishing slow movement, and our beloved CSO Principal Oboe Jenny Clapp is not to be missed in the role of soloist.

Affectionately referred to as 'the father of the Symphony,' Haydn wrote over 100 of them – many noted for their remarkable originality of form for the time. Haydn's cheerful 89th Symphony comes from his years working in the court of Prince Nikolaus Esterházy, and he cleverly mined material from several of his own earlier works, reassigning it for this sparkling combination of strings and winds.

This musical curation is a celebration of youthful talent. We welcome you to open your ears to the sound world of Ōtautahi-born composer Isaac Shatford. He says of this new commission: "Open is such a fabulous word. It's exciting – an opening is a beginning, an opportunity. It's terrifying – openness is uncertainty, vulnerability. This piece balances, fleetingly, on that precarious tipping point."

Our very own Principal Horn Emma Eden takes centre stage in Richard Strauss' ebullient Horn Concerto No. 1. Strauss may have only been 18 when he began work on this concerto, but his childhood had included a particularly full immersion into the world of the horn – his father was the Principal Horn of the Munich Court Orchestra.

Mozart wrote his first symphony at the age of eight, and had stacked up many more before his death at the age of just 35. His penultimate No. 40 is one of his most popular symphonies, full of dark passion and swagger. The themes are often used in film, television, and popular culture including the opening phrase becoming one of the most iconic ringtones of the earliest mobile phones.


Celebrating John Williams

CSO & Ché-Fu

CSO loves connecting with musicians who have left a lasting musical legacy across Aotearoa, and this year we collaborate with Aotearoa New Zealand hip-hop icon Ché-Fu. A versatile artist who first rose to fame as a founding member of the award-winning band Supergroove in the nineties, Ché-Fu features on many songs that have since achieved 'classic kiwi anthem' status – the likes of Can't Get Enough and You Gotta Know.

Ché-Fu went on to a successful solo career with albums that earned him many accolades, and he helped pave the way for other local artists, who witnessed the genre reaching new heights of mainstream popularity and commercial success. Audiences may remember Fade Away, which won him Single of the Year at the 2002 New Zealand Music Awards, and Misty Frequencies, which took home the APRA Silver Scroll that same year. Ché-Fu's captivating performances as a pioneer of hip-hop and Pasifika music in Aotearoa have earned him a Pacific Music Awards Lifetime Achievement Award, and the title of Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM).
