President's Report

The 84° Annual Report of the Christchurch Civic Music Council for the year ending 30 June 2025.

The year since our last AGM has flashed by and your Executive have been busy as this report might suggest.

One key requirement was to address the requirements of the Incorporated Societies Act 2022 that sets out a number of key rules and provisions that all societies must have in their constitution or rules. The revised rules must be registered by April 2026 in order that the registration as a society remains current.

In addition to providing for the compulsory rules the Executive considered a number of other amendments such as the removal of the office of vice president, setting the number of members of the executive at between 5-7 and providing for meetings to be conducted by use of audio – visual technology.

The draft rules that have been circulated includes provision for membership by individuals. This possible new category of membership will be up for consideration at the AGM. I urge current affiliates and their members to give careful consideration to the issue of allowing individuals to become members and if this is something that you think might be of benefit.

I look forward to a robust and positive discussion at the coming AGM of the proposed new rules and welcome any questions or queries before that meeting if members wish to contact me or any member of the Executive.

The new commercial terms and conditions for hire of venues managed by Venues Otautahi was also considered. A meeting was held with their business management team to press the position of not for profit and charitable groups that cannot always meet the requirement for a deposit in the amount of the base hire fee, and that have to comply with the strict terms of community funding agencies. This was the case in our hire of the Wolfbrook arena for the Strum, Strike and Blow event. What was described as a bespoke payment arrangement was negotiated. If other groups have a similar problem with booking terms and conditions for major venues, the Council will assist where possible, if approached.

The events diary on the Music Canterbury website indicates the busy programme of concerts and events that can be found across the city every month. The number of community choirs, orchestras, bands and ensembles affirms the vibrant performing arts community that we enjoy and the significant number of individuals that experience the enjoyment and benefits of music making.

What is also evident is the growing input of a wide variety of ethnic communities throughout the region that are proud to preserve and present their musical and performance traditions. This continues to add to the diversity of our community and the experiences on offer. We hope to bring that community and their events into our calendar.

Another milestone that was celebrated this year was the 70th anniversary of the School of Music, the history of which will be so well known to many and that Mark Walton wrote of in his piece for the Press in mid-July. Music Canterbury wrote to the City Council to support the CSM in the plan to acquire the site adjacent to The Piano in Armagh Street for a new and permanent home base. The tireless work of Celia Stewart and her administration team, teachers, volunteers and CSM Council members deserve the opportunity to have a new home base and to cement the CSM as a pivotal part of the performing arts community in Christchurch.

The Strum Strike & Blow event that we run in conjunction with Music Education Canterbury continues to grow in numbers and popularity so much so that some possible limit on numbers above the expected 1,700 children this year may have to be considered.

We have engaged recently with Tomas Hurnik of the Baroque Music Trust in relation to the harpsichord that is housed at Knox church. In order to see this instrument used more regularly Tomas has offered to have a performer visiting in February next year from Europe have a look at the harpsichord. Please do not forget this instrument is available for performances of baroque works.

We record a special thank you to two executive members that have or are about to stand down ... Robert Tait and Denise Murfitt. Both have provided valued assistance in the years they have been on the executive and we are grateful to both of them.

We would not function as efficiently as we do without the stirling work of Carmel and Cynthia our ever resourceful and hard-working secretary and treasurer. We are most appreciative of their commitment to the work of Music Canterbury.

Strum Strike and Blow 2025:

The 2025 Strum Strike and Blow concert held on Wednesday 3rd September 2025 was again a fun and colourful concert which is expertly and professionally planned and directed by our Artistic Directors Judith Bell and Celia Stewart. It attracted 1560 young performers from 54 schools from the Canterbury region. The enthusiastic joy of the young musicians as they performed on their marimbas, ukuleles and recorders was very rewarding. Special guests included Shiki (Koto Group) performing with Japanese String Instruments, Mahina-Ina Kingi-Kaui with recorders and Jenny Payne and 1 Drop Nation band with the ukuleles. We are most grateful for the public and private financial support received for this event and to the Rotary Club of Avonhead for their assistance at the Wolfbrook Arena.

Ruby Hay Pianoforte Scholarship:

Unfortunately, due to unforeseen circumstances the Ruby Hay Pianoforte Competition has had to be cancelled this year. We are of course very disappointed, and we look forward to another competition in 2026.

National Concerto Competition 2024 - 2025:

We are pleased to report that a very successful 2024/2025 National Concerto Competition was held culminating in a wonderful Final on 22nd March 2025 in the Douglas Lilburn Auditorium. The Final presented Piano Concerti Tchaikovsky No.1 (Shan Liu), Brahms No.2 (Henry Meng) and Prokofiev No.3 (Otis Prescott-Mason). The audience was treated to a special performance while awaiting the outcome – a piano duet by Michael Houstoun and Michael Endres. Adjudicators Rachel Fuller (Christchurch born) and Timothy Young (Australia) were impressed with each contestant's high calibre playing, but it was the exuberant and captivating performance of the Tchaikovsky concerto that secured the prestigious title for 15-year-old Shan Liu. Henry Meng was runner-up for a second year running and Otis Prescott-Mason third.

The 2025/2026 preliminaries will be held at The Piano from 2 to 4 December 2025 and will showcase a variety of instruments, other than piano. The Final will take place in the Douglas Lilburn Auditorium on Saturday 7 March 2026, with the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra conducted once again by James Judd. Adjudicators include Mark Walton (Christchurch/Australia), Wilma Smith (NZ/Australia) and Donald Maurice (Wellington). With Michael Houstoun as our Patron, we look forward to hosting many more competitions in the future.

We have also like to acknowledge the retirement of Michael Lawrence from the competition. Michael became a Trustee in September 2016 and the Chair from February 2019 until July 2022. The Trustees would like to thank Michael for his wonderful service and contributions to the competition which will be greatly missed.

Entity's Purpose or Mission:

Objects; 1. To secure by co-operation with civic and other authorities and organisations the fullest measure of public recognition and support of all forms of musical activity and to encourage the active interest and participation of the community in all forms of music making. 2. To foster and promote the study, practice and performance of musical works and in particular of choral, orchestral and operatic works. 3. To promote combined music festivals from time to time as may be practicable. 4. To co-operate with organisations having similar objects throughout New Zealand.

Entity Structure:

The CCMC is governed by the Executive which consists of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and nine various members of a representative affiliated organisation elected at the AGM. Each elected member shall hold office for up to three years eligible for re-election at the end of their term. The CCMC established The Christchurch Civic Music Council National Concerto Competition Trust, and an update of the Trust's activities is provided at the AGM. The CCMC has three member types; affiliates (established musical organisations) that are independent entities and agree to co-operate with the CCMC in its efforts, associated organisations that have the capacity to support the objects, and honorary life members elected by not less than three quarters of the members present at any AGM.

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources:

Operating costs are covered by a grant from the Christchurch City Council, and the affiliate subscription annual fee. Concerts are funded by grants, programme advertising and door ticket sales. Some revenue is received for piano and harpsicord hire.

Main Methods Used by the Entity to Raise Funds:

The Secretary applies for grants to cover the costs of concerts and seek programme advertising income. The Secretary also applies for the Christchurch City Council grant (from the Strengthening Communities fund) and manages the piano and harpsichord hire.

Entity's Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Services:

All Executive members are encouraged to be actively involved in working on the CCMC's objects. Executive members are volunteers. The Secretary and Treasurer receive an honorarium to cover their costs. Every year an Executive member runs the Ruby Hay Competition. General meetings are currently run at the Christchurch School of Music at no cost.

Description of the Entity's Outcomes:

The CCMC organised two concerts to help strengthen music in the community. This first was the very popular *Strum Strike* and *Blow* which was held at Wolfbrook Arena on Thursday 15th August 2024. It was a very popular concert for the children participating and the large audience in attendance. The second concert was *Spring into Music* held on Sunday 22nd September 2024 at the Great Hall, Arts Centre. This was a free community event which attracted eight affiliate groups playing in 30-minute time slots. Affiliates are actively encouraged to utilise the Music Canterbury website to promote their concerts, and the Secretary maintains a calendar to assist affiliates plan the dates of their concerts.

Statement of Accounting Policies

"How did we do our accounting?"

For the year ended 30 June 2025

Basis of Preparation

Christchurch Civic Music Council Incorporated (CCMC) has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$5,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tay

Christchurch Civic Music Council Incorporated (CCMC) is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Interest and Reserves

If the Statement of Performance is a surplus before interest, total interest received is transferred to reserves proportional to the opening reserve balances.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are depreciated using the following rates. Music Library is valued at realisable value.

Office Equipment, diminishing value 20%-30%

Instruments, straight line 3%

Computer and setup, straight line 30%

Related Parties

The CCMC National Concerto Competition Trust is associated with the CCMC and the administration of both entitles are carried out in the same office. The CCMC pay office expenses and oncharges 50%.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Committee of The Christchurch Civic Music Incorporated

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Christchurch Civic Music Incorporated, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, the statement of financial performance, the statement of service performance, the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the accompanying Performance Report presents fairly, in all material respects:

- (a) the entity information for the year ended 30 June 2025;
- (b) the service performance for the year ended 30 June 2025, in that the service performance information is appropriate and meaningful and prepared in accordance with the entity's measurement bases or evaluation methods:

The Trust is currently in discussions with the CSO and also The Piano to seek support on costs, and cost cutting measures are also in place. The Trust has appointed Michael Houston as Patron, and he has helped to introduce further sources of funding. This work is ongoing. The Trust agreed to run the competition this year (final in March 2026) depending on the level of secured funding. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are
 appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the
 Board's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Trustees.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting by the Trustees and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Board's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Board to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and
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 presentation.

We communicate with the Trustees regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

We also provide the Trustees with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.


